

Friends from eighteen Monthly Meetings and nine worship groups met in Madisonville, Tennessee, Sixth Month 9-12, 1994, for our twenty-fourth annual meeting of Southern Appalachian Yearly Meeting and Association (SAYMA). Attending were approximately 140 adults, 45 children and teens.

The theme for this year's gathering was New Light on an Old Fox. SAYMA's own Larry Ingle spoke to us about the historical George Fox, based on his book, First Among Friends; George Fox and the Creation of Quakerism.

Friends were reminded of and introduced to a very human Fox and the context in which he lived. Fox's success was based on an understanding of his era. We were reminded that changes we wish to bring about today must be based on an understanding of our times.

Of special importance to us are the times, planned and unplanned, when Friends of different ages interact. For the second year, children chose or continued their friendship with a Penn Friend. Several young Penn Friends reported on the success of their first year to both the Junior Yearly Meeting and the adult business meeting. Young Friends spoke of gathering experiences as varied as the meetings and worship groups they represented. Field trips to the Bald River Falls and the Lost Sea Cave, whitewater rafting and repelling, as well as the swimming at the gathering site were much appreciated. Learning experiences included making friendship bracelets and kites, book browsing, singing and a dramatic presentation performed to the larger gathering on seventh day evening. Included in the learning experience was the dancing seventh day late evening and although dances were not always done with mastery, they were done with much enthusiasm and friendship by young and older Friends

done with much enthusiasm and friendship by young and older Friends alike. In talking with the Young Friends about what they considered most rewarding, meeting and making friends was the thought most often expressed.

WEST KNOXVILLE Tennessee The work of Quakers- work that we know on paper- became real to us this weekend. Crossville, Tennessee, Friends have been organizing a shipment to Nicaragua of toys and medical, school, and agricultural supplies in a newly refrigerated truck. Friends from several meetings brought supplies with them to load into the truck at Yearly Meeting.

Alison Oldham of Friends Committee on National Legislation brought FCNL's work alive for us in an excellent presentation during business meeting. This was our first experience with a practice of inviting one wider Quaker organization each year to make a more extended presentation during business meeting than our customary brief reports, and we were very pleased with the model Alison Oldham set.

As Quaker house in Fayetteville, North Carolina, prepares to celebrate its 25th year in October, Quaker House director Sandy Sweitzer inspired us with stories of work with soldiers and interracial relations in the community. Other workshops informed us on both Quaker projects and processes we can use in our meetings. Visitors from other Yearly Meetings reminded us that there is much to learn from other Friends' ways.

Difficult acoustics in our meeting space prompted us to become more familiar with using a microphone. One Friend enlivened our discussion of Friends General Conference's mission statement by moving among us with the microphone like a TV talk show host in what proved to be an effective and welcome change of pace.

An examining committee was appointed to consider and report to yearly meeting in 1995 on revisions to the <u>Guide to Our Faith and Practice</u>, relating to whether or not all attenders and members of SAYMA are welcomed and treated equally, regardless of sexual orientation and religious experience; as well as the process of revision itself.

A minute for Friends Peace Team Project was read and accepted. The Friends Peace Team Project is a network of Friends who will seek out Friends trained in conflict resolution and non-violent action to make themselves available for peacemaking at home and abroad.

SAYMA BUSINESS MEETING at Hiwassee College, Madisonville, Tennessee 6/10/94 - 6/12/94

SIXTH DAY, JUNE 10, 1994

Meeting began at 9:38 AM with a few moments of silence. (There were 45 people in attendence.)

Minute 9406-1 Peggy Bonnington, Clerk of Nominating Committee recommended that Free Polazzo, (Atlanta) finish the term that Bill Boyd had resigned from as SAYMA Recording Clerk. Approved.

Minute 9406-2 Nominating Committee Clerk further recommended Janet Minshall as an additional member at large to serve on the Administrative Oversight Committee. Approved.

Minute 9406-3 Minutes of the Fifth Month 1993 business meeting were approved with one correction. The list of names in the minute appointing members to a Committee on Revisions for SAYMA's Guide to Our Faith and Our Practice should have included "Nancy Lee-Riffe, " and not " Nancy Whitt."

The Clerk read from SAYMA's Faith and Practice about the need for Friends to re-examine the "Guide to Our Faith and Our Practice" (1990). Discussion followed about how often SAYMA's Faith and Practice can be or should be revised. Nancy Lee-Riffe will report back to Business Meeting on First Day, the results of a Saturday meeting of the Committee on Revisions to our Guide to our Faith and our Practice.

Four Friends agreed to write the Epistle this Yearly Meeting: Barbara Esther, Carol Lamm (convener), Michael Harless, and Harry Rogers.

There was a discussion of having Junior Yearly Meeting write an epistle or be involved in SAYMA Friend as a way to get the younger folks involved.

Written copies of the **proposed SAYMA budget** were not yet available, but Assistant Clerk described the process used to develop the budget and mentioned that there is an increase in the Administrative area to allow for training of the new Administrative Assistant.

The Assistant Clerk, also reminded the Business Meeting that any proposed budget line items that are new, need to be submitted to the Finance Committee for it's consideration by the SAYMA Representatives Meeting which precedes the Yearly Meeting.

Visitors were introduced and welcomed: Allison Oldham, Friendship Meeting and FCNL; Nancy Gideon Clark, Homewood Meeting and Baltimore Yearly Meeting; Al Carwile of Friendship Meeting.

The Clerk reported that Woodland Monthly Meeting, which has requested membership in SAYMA, decided not to attend or to receive visitors from our Yearly Meeting until mediation of a property dispute is settled.

A Minute was presented from Tri-Cities Monthly Meeting asking to establish a Yearly Meeting Committee for Sufferings. This will be considered further, at the First Day Business Session of this Yearly Meeting.

A short recess was held from 10:45 to 10:52 AM Several Wider Quaker Organizations gave reports: AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE (AFSC):

Bill Holland, Regional Executive Director of AFSC-SERO gave a report about peace work in the Middle East and South Africa programs which is now coming to fruition after many long years of effort. He asked Friends to meet with him to help clarify what work AFSC should be doing in South Africa, now that Apartheid is ended.

Larry Ingle, SAYMA representative to the AFSC Corporation, reported that one important item before the corporation was the relationship between yearly meetings and AFSC. The specific concern was about whether non-Friends should serve on the Board of AFSC. Larry asked for Friends' insights and leadings on that issue.

FRIENDS WORLD COMMITTEE ON CONSULTATION (FWCC):

Barbara Esther, one of SAYMA's FWCC representative, reported on FWCC's work. She will be joining the Youth Pilgrimage Committee which will be sponsoring a group of Young Friends who would be going to England this year and another group to Mexico(pages 18-21) in 1995. She suggested that SAYMA's youth may want to be involved in getting to know other Yearly Meeting's Youth. The Tri-ennial will be meeting this year in New Mexico. Pat Lyon also reported that FWCC is producing Spanish versions of several Friends works.

The Clerk presented a Friends Peace Teams Project proposal with a letter from Elise Boulding and Mary Lord (attached). Betina Wolf will facilitate a lunch meeting of interested Friends to respond to two questions:

Do we unite with the mission of the project?

Do we want to be part of the coordinating council and support sending representatives?

Harry Rogers, Columbia Meeting and Palmetto Area Gathering reported that the Penn Center will be holding a work camp this Fall.

Bettina Wolff, Asheville Meeting, reported on the status of the proposed SAYMA Handbook. It is anticipated that a completed version can be reported to the 1995 Yearly Meeting.

She also reported that the attempt to accumulate records for Archival purposes is proceeding slowly.

SAYMA records are presently being sent to Swarthmore College, only. Guilford is not receiving our yearly meeting's records and concern was expressed that this needs to be considered. Mary Calhoun and Nelson Fuson agreed to work with Bettina on this project.

Steven Guesman, from Birmingham, asked about filing for 501 C 3 tax exempt status. He was referred to Peggy Bonnington. Concerns expressed by attendees were twofold: How to get the exemption and then whether or not to apply for the exemption.

The Nominating Committee Clerk asked whether we needed to increase our Yearly Meetings representation to the Wider Quaker Organizations. Allison Oldham said that FCNL needs more representatives. Bill Holland said that AFSC needs more Friends. Discussion about how to fill the needs for time, energy and money followed. After discussion this concern was referred back to Nominating Committee for recommendations.

The Recording Clerk read the three minutes that had been approved by the Business Meeting.

After a few moments of silent prayer, the meeting ended with handshakes 11:59 AM. Next business meeting is on Saturday, June 11, 1994 at 9:30 AM at Brock Hall.

SEVENTH DAY, JUNE 11, 1994

Meeting for Business began at 9:34 with a moment of silence. (There were 90 people in attendance.)

The Clerk read queries from SAYMA's "A Guide to Our Faith and Our Practice."

"Are your meetings for business held in the spirit of worship? Are you considerate of differing views, coming to a decision only when the meeting has found its sense of unity?

Do you hold in the Light the need to share your views even though you are in the minority? Can you allow the meeting, if it so led, to go forward even though you are not in full agreement?"

Dennis Gregg, Treasurer, submitted the SAYMA General Fund Report through 5/31/94. (Attachment) Key numbers from the report are:

Janet Minshall, SAYMA Administrative Assistant, distributed the Administrative Assistant's Annual Report to the business meeting. (Attachment)

SAYMA and meetings are asked when in doubt where to send requested information or materials, to route everything through the SAYMA office.

Minute 9406-6 The meeting approved a minute commending Janet Minshall for the excellent job she did in setting up the SAYMA office and procedures.

Alison Oldham, staff member from Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL) gave a report about the work of the organization. Members of Congress appreciate how FCNL represents viewpoints which include more than just its own interests, unlike most other lobbying groups. Friends reach unity on many concerns, allowing FCNL to work on a variety of important issues. Friends were asked to suggest ways in which circulation of the FCNL newsletter can be increased from the present 8,000 copies. FCNL does not approve of "Astroturf" (fill in the blanks) letter writing campaigns and chooses to stay with "grassroots" campaigns and individually written postcards or letters.

At 10:53 AM a break was announced by the Clerk. Meeting reconvened at 11:02 AM.

The SAYMA Administrative Assistant announced that Athens (GA) Monthly Meeting (SAYMA's newest) will be added to the SAYMA letterhead at the next printing.

Gary Luckowitz of Asheville, from **Site Selection Committee** announced that Warren Wilson College in Swannanoa, North Carolina, had been selected as the site for the 1995 yearly meeting. No other groups will be on campus. Most dorms are not air conditioned, but the windows can be opened (cheers), and there are many motels in the area. It was suggested that we need to select one site for several years in a row and plan for longer lead times to increase our choices.

The Clerk reported that Young Friends have said they like the second weekend in June for Yearly Meeting.

A discussion followed concerning how "central" the location for Yearly Meeting needs to be. Further discussion on locations of future Yearly Meeting sites will occur at Representative Meeting.

Al Carwile, Friends General Conference (FGC) representative from Friendship MM and Piedmont Friends Fellowship, reported that a volunteer Field Representative position is being created to help Yearly Meetings which do not have any staff to coordinate better.

Perry Treadwell, SAYMA representative to FGC presented, in "Geraldo style" a question and answer session about what FGC does, besides sponsor the Gathering. Retreat leaders, and youth leadership workshops were cited as important services offered. Friends asked for regional gatherings, more spiritual events, and changing the time of year of the FGC Gathering. Friends also requested that the FGC Gathering return to the Southern part of the United States, and combining Pendle Hill's "On the Road" program with FGC's Speaker Series was suggested, as was a video tape to show how wonderful the Gathering experience can be. More exposure to Friends (networking) was also requested.

Clerk of FGC Personnel Committee, Connie Lamont (Birmingham, AL) asked for involvement of each of us in the process of defining what the Field Representatives will do.

John Lewis, SAYMA's representative to the American Friends Service Committee, Southeastern Region, (AFSC-SERO) reported that an important function of AFSC is to bring diverse peoples together to reach decisions using Friends process.

The business meeting was asked to think about how well SAYMA's paid Junior Yearly Meeting Coordinator position has worked out and to communicate ideas and suggestions.

Friends greatly enjoyed a lively presentation about "Penn Friends" made by Megan Baker and Abbey Hearne. (Attachment)

Meeting ended with a few moments of silence at 12:05 PM.

The next Business Meeting is Scheduled for Sunday, June 12, 1994 at Baker Hall.

FIRST DAY, JUNE 12, 1994

Meeting for Business began with a few moments of silence at 9:30 AM. (There were 84 people in attendance.)

The Recording Clerk read the minutes that were approved yesterday morning. No changes were suggested.

Sandy Sweitzer, Director of Quaker House in Fayetteville, NC was introduced. She reported that Quaker House is celebrating their 25th Anniversary. "25,000 soldiers and 15 Quakers" was the title of a workshop she offered yesterday. One of their former board members commented upon his return after a 15 year absence from the Quaker House; "We're gaining on them!"

Junior Yearly Meeting Gathering reported their activities by having the children show pictures describing what they most enjoyed doing. The pictures were posted in the hall.

Young Friends Clerk, Ariel Hearne, introduced other young friends who each described a memorable experience they had during Yearly Meeting.

Minute 9406-8 Business Meeting approved the establishment within the Yearly Meeting, of a Committee on Quaker Witness and Sufferings with a 3 year term. The Committee's purpose is outlined in the following paragraph:

The Committee on Quaker Witness and Sufferings is to document what individual Friends suffer to witness their faith and to share Friends faith-driven witness and sufferings within the Religious Society of Friends, with elected representatives, government officials and others.

Committee Members are approved are: Diane Bauknight, Steven Geusmann, Errol Hess (Convener), Martha Hunter, Janet Minshall

The Friends Peace Team Project, is seeking support from Friends Yearly Meetings to become established as a Section of FWCC.

In response to concerns expressed about the additional work that would be required when new initiatives are started, Friends were asked to consider what it would be like to become a "honeycomb without any honey." As we are become more institutional all the time, do we still have "honey" (substance for our institutions to support)? Even though at a room full of Friends expressed that they want to work with this concern at a meeting yesterday, others are still concerned that they would have to do something. The meeting was asked to allow us to have some "honey for our honeycomb".

Minute 9404-9 Friends approved A SAYMA Peace Team Project's Mission Statement: As Friends, we believe that faithfulness to the injunction to love our neighbors, including those who hate us, requires more than statements abhorring war and violence: We must actively search for alternatives which will enable all to learn to peacefully and creatively resolve conflicts and overcome differences, in our communities as well as in the larger world. We must actively work to create a world in which it is safe to be a minority and in which security derives from trust, not power or advantage."

Minute 9404-10 A SAYMA Peace Team Project Committee was approved for a three year period:

Minute 9404-11 A SAYMA Faith and Practice Examining Committee was approved for a one year period. The committee, to be convened by Nancy Lee-Riffe, will meet at 9:00 AM at the West Knoxville, TN Meetinghouse on September 3, 1994.

This Committee will examine FIVE (5) and only Five (5) specific matters in "A Guide to Our Faith and Our Practice" (GUIDE):

- Homosexuality and whether or not gay and lesbian attendees and members are welcomed and given equal treatment in SAYMA.
- Marriage
- Christianity, especially clarification of the relationship between Christianity and Quakerism within SAYMA.
- The nature and role of queries in the GUIDE, and specifically whether or not queries on Patriarchy should be developed and included
- The procedures to be followed in future examinations and revisions of the GUIDE.

Committee recommendations will be distributed to monthly meetings for their thoughtful examination by March 1995, and will be presented to the Yearly Meeting in June 1995.

Discussion on how money and resources are allocated to committees of SAYMA. Friends were agreed that the long standing practice of paying for reasonable costs for postage, mailing and phone calls are available to all SAYMA committees as part of the regular SAYMA budget line item for administrative expenses.

Minute 9406-12 Appreciation was expressed to the 1994 Yearly Meeting Planning Committee for a job well done.

Minute 9406-13 The SAYMA Epistle was approved. (attachment)


Minute 94006-14 Appreciation to the Host College was expressed with a letter to be written by the Clerk on behalf of the Yearly Meeting.

The SAYMA Administrative Assistant, functioning as staff for the Yearly Meeting (Y M) Office, has been throughout this year the primary contact and information resource for SAYMA, and has assisted the SAYMA Clerk with the planning and preparation of agendas, and the follow up of Y M and Representative Meeting business sessions. Staff has, in 1993-94, consolidated the data gathering and mailing list functions of SAYMA, and is, in the Summer of '94, in process of refining the layout of the SAYMA Directory due out in the Fall. (The first edition of the Directory was developed over the Summer of '93, and distributed at the Fall Representative Meeting in Atlanta.)

Staff has maintained regular contact through periodic mailings, individual correspondence, telephone and FAX communications, with Clerks and SAYMA Representatives in each of the 33 meetings and worship groups which relate to or are members of SAYMA, and with contacts in every Y M and Wider Quaker Organization(WQO) listed in the various FWCC Directories.

Staff has recently, as a result of progressive physical disability, submitted a letter of resignation from the job of Administrative Assistant (AA), drafted a revised job description to more accurately reflect the requirements and responsibilities of the position, and drafted a plan for orientation and training of a new staff person (attached).

Work in the Y M Office now averages 8 1/2 hours per week, or about 38 hours per month, as a result of increased volume of communications and additional reports prepared and submitted. Staff feels that the work of the AA now takes all of the hours allotted, and so has asked the SAYMA Administrative Oversight Committee to examine carefully any further requests for AA time, and either remove and replace some of the present assignments, or refuse the request.



The cost of operating the Y M Office 7-1-93 to 7-1-94 is averaging \$570 per month including wages, office expenses, local travel -- all the routine costs billed to SAYMA on a monthly basis (\$570 x 12 = \$6,840 per year). In addition, there were \$411 in equipment costs -- a new hard drive for the computer, and a used file cabinet for SAYMA Archives). There were also about \$3,000 in costs associated with a special project carried out by the Staff -- the development of the first SAYMA Directory. Income from Faith and Practice and Directory copies sold averaged about \$50 mo (\$585 for the year), through the Y M Office, and \$105 through the YM Bookstore.

SAYMA ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT JOB DESCRIPTION 5-1-94

The purpose of establishing the Administrative Assistant position is "to make the SAYMA Clerk's job doable" i.e. to relieve the Clerk of excessive paperwork and administrative detail so that she/he might more fully attend to the spiritual life and activities of the Yearly Meeting.

A Staff Oversight Committee, made up of the SAYMA Clerk, the Treasurer, and two at-large representatives, as well as a representative of the host site meeting as appropriate, oversees both the functioning of the SAYMA Office and the Admin. Asst. position. The Admin. Asst. prepares and submits written narrative and financial reports to the Staff Oversight Committee before each Representative and Yearly Meeting business session, as well as a one page summary each year to the Yearly Meeting membership.

The Clerk of SAYMA provides supervision and direction to the Administrative Assistant between business sessions in cooperation with the Staff Oversight Committee, and prioritizes work to be done in the Yearly Meeting Office. The budget for the Yearly Meeting Office and for any special projects assigned to the Admin. Asst., is developed by the SAYMA Treasurer and Finance Committee in full consultation with the Staff Oversight Committee and the Admin. Asst.

RESPONSIBILITES OF THE SAYMA ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

The SAYMA Admin. Asst. serves as the primary contact person and information resource for SAYMA. In this capacity the Admin. Asst.'s responsibilities include but are not limited to:

1.) Receiving, routing and/or responding to enquiries, requests, and announcements

coming to the SAYMA Office by mail, telephone, FAX, etc.

2.) Assisting the SAYMA Clerk in the planning and preparation of agendas and follow

up of YM and Representative Meeting business sessions.

3.) Maintaining a current mailing list/directory of individuals, meetings and worship groups in SAYMA, as well as current mailing lists for communications with SAYMA officers, meeting clerks and representatives, and SAYMA's Wider Quaker Organization representatives. Depending on the previous experience of the person hired, orientation and training should be accomplished in six weeks to two months. It is expected that beginning 6-15 to 7-15-94, pending availability of both parties, the present SAYMA Administrative Assistant will start to cut back her hours at the same time that she begins the process of turning over SAYMA Office responsibilities. She will decrease hours month to month until orientation and training are completed. The new staff person will start at six hours per week and increase hours month to month until orientation and training are completed. It is expected that all responsibilities will be assumed by the new staff person by 9-15-94 at the latest, perhaps sooner.

During the first two weeks of orientation, the focus will be on office routine -- mail, the answering machine, the computer, purchasing, bookeeping, billing and bill paying, and record keeping. In the process of computer training, the consultant/contract worker who put the directory and mail lists on the SAYMA Office computer will be called back in for a few hours as a resource to teach the new Admin. Asst. how to make changes and modifications in the programs.

By mid to late July, both trainer and trainee will put out a mailing to Yearly Meetings and Wider Quaker Organizations together, and work on updating the SAYMA Directory, census information, and the SAF mailing list. By early August, preliminary drafts of directory entries will be in preparation along with confirmation of census and SAF information received, and a full mailing to SAYMA Clerks, Reps and Officers will occur. By early September, the new directory will be ready for printing, and the mailing for the next Representative Meeting will be in preparation. After that, the present SAYMA Administrative Assistant will be available as a resource as needed for both the new SAYMA Administrative Assistant and the SAYMA Staff Oversight Committee.
